I. Deadline Extensions

In response to request(s) and due to the City's inadvertent omission of questions from Addendum #1, the deadline for responses to the Request for Quotes for Bulk Residential Broadband Internet Access Services (the RFQ) is extended and the schedule is changed as follows:

II. Answers to Questions

The following questions regarding the Request for Quotes for Bulk Residential Broadband Internet Access Services (the RFQ) were submitted to the City of Gonzales (the City) by the November 16, 2017 deadline, but were inadvertently not included in the answers posted on November 20, 2017. Minor, non-substantive edits were made for the purpose of consistency of style. This addendum was posted on the City's website and sent via email to all who submitted questions.

1. Is there any information available on housing unit types in Gonzales, in map form? (i.e. MDUs vs. Homes, density, etc.)

2. Is the City aware of any CASF/RUS funds available for this project? Does it expect any to be made available?
- A. The City is not aware of any CASF or RUS funds available for this project.
3. Does the City expect any/all of a network build in the area to be conducted on poles? If so, is any information available regarding pole stock and pole ownership?
4. Does the City expect any/all of a network build to be underground? If so, is any information available regarding Right of Way distances, standards and access?
- A. Decisions, if any, regarding construction techniques are the responsibility of respondents. The City believes the utility poles within the city limits are owned by either the Northern California Joint Pole Association or PG&E. Access to the public right of way will be governed by California law and regulation, including the Public Utilities Code and California Public Utilities Commission decisions. There are 21 centerline miles of public streets in Gonzales.
5. Is there any existing empty conduit, duct or similar assets available in the City?
- A. The City is not aware of any.
